If you talked to me a year ago and again now you wouldn't be talking to the same person, yes they are both me but it's the new me you're listening too now. In all honesty lockdown was one of the best things to happen to me in the last year, it gave me time to focus on myself and get my priorities straight.

My confidence went through the roof and I couldn't be happier with where my life is and where it's going. I now know what my values are and who I value in my life, I have made life goals that would have never crossed my mind this time last year, which has made me excited for the future. All I need now is for the world to open back up and when it does, I'll be ready for it.

The idea for Carla's Kingdom was inspired by the eulogy of Andrew McGinley and the memories of his children who passed away, as well as, the memories of Happy Feet student Clodagh Magliozzi, daughter of David and Dierdre Magliozzi, from Rathcoole who passed away in 2013. The support from the local community, communities beyond the four districts, local businesses, charities, sports clubs, and schools on the day of the event was truly overwhelming. The event proved not only to be a great fundraising success with raffles, face painting, music, cakes, and rock painting, but an opportunity for this community to be together for a lovely morning, full of love, laughter, tears, and hugs.

Andrew McGinley is an avid supporter of this community and continues to, in honour of the memory of his children, advocate regarding the huge impact that community, creches, schools, sports clubs, and extracurricular activities have on who our children become. It is that message that led to the idea of Carla's Kingdom, a playground planned for the blackthorn hill location of Happy Feet.

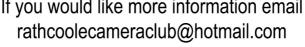

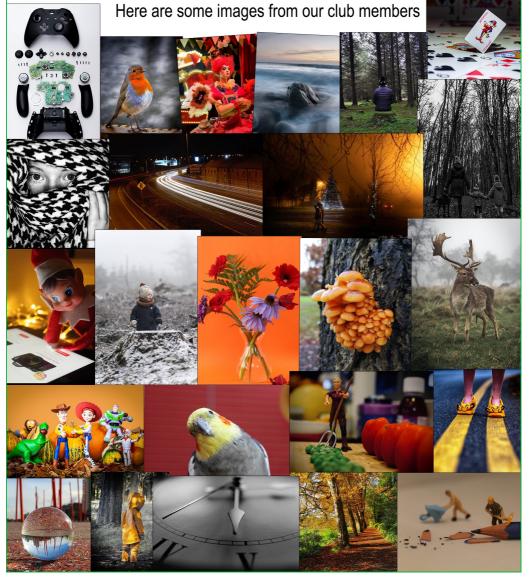

Try out some meditations on YouTube as short as 1 minute until you find ones you like.

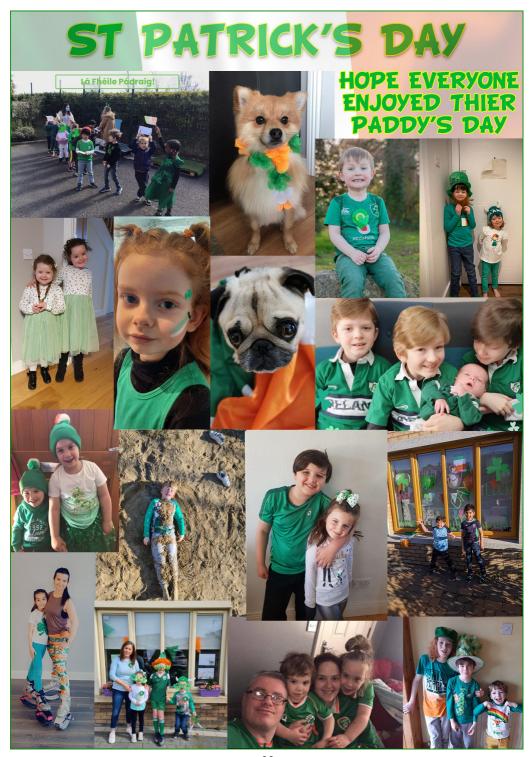
Savour the good moments and breathe them in.

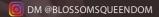

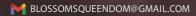

#### The Rathcoole Playing Fields History by Paddy Gavin (short summary)

In 1967 I came to live in Rathcoole and in the autumn of that year the carriageway was open and became known as the Naas Dual Carriageway. This made such a difference to the village with the removal of heavy traffic from Rathcoole main street.

Within a few years, when many of the new houses were occupied and a young generation of children were growing up, the question of infrastructure, such as schools, shops, play areas and other services became a priority. In Rathcoole at this time, there was a local Garda Sargent, Jim McKeever, who was very conscious of the need to provide recreational amenities for the youth of the area. He invited a group of parishioners to consider electing a Community Council for the immediate area. Until then the only representation of residents' interests was catered for by Saggart and Rathcoole residents association under the chairmanship of Sean Nolan.

Sean Nolan was a dedicated community activist worker and became the first chairman of the newly formed Saggart & Rathcoole Community Council and served as an excellent chairman for nearly 20 years. Over that time Sean Nolan built up the Community Council to one of the most active in the county. The two major pursuits of the time in our area were a Community Centre and playing fields, but first of course it was funding which had to be considered. Dublin County Council was approached, and they made it clear that they would help by means of grants, but that there would be no full funding for amenity projects at that time. This of course left a major responsibility on the Community Council to fundraise. The initial project was to build a Community Centre. Several means of fund raising began including non-stop draws, carnivals, dinner dances, concerts, dog shows, discos, and auctions of household items. Soon there were sufficient funds for a deposit to qualify for a bank loan to purchase a site and build a Community Centre.

The Community Council worked hard during the 1970s and 1980s to pay off the loan and start to accumulate some funding for the provision of the local playing fields. The County Council were now being asked to keep and provide some local lands before it was bought up by builders for future housing. It was now past the 1980s but the Co. Council did respond and ear marked some 70 acres of agricultural land on the eastern side of the village known as "Stassens Lands". After long negotiations, this land was eventually purchased by the County Council. Even then, nothing happened on the purchased lands for nearly two years. By then there were several newly formed clubs in the area making demands for pitches and play areas. The County Council too were making demands for monies from the Community Council to help develop the playing fields and the park.

After several meetings with the County Council's senior landscape architect, Mr. Christy Boylan, agreement was reached on the layout of the new park. A substantial sum of money was paid over to the County Council. The agreement provided for following items:

Two GAA pitches and a Soccer pitch.

A playground and a rose garden.

A network of tarmacadam surfaced pedestrian pathways.

A landscape scheme of tree and shrub planting throughout.

Re-alignment of the stream and some waterfalls.

Also, to plant and maintain the 3-corner field that was given by John Mulholland as an open space for Coolamber and Beechwood estates.

All of these facilities were intended for the residents of both Saggart and Rathcoole.

At this time also we were fortunate to have two local Councillors on Dublin County Council, who in fairness to them pushed hard to provide Rathcoole Park and other local facilities.

In the early 1990s an area about 3 to 4 acres adjoining the N7 was removed from the Park to make way for a link road between the villages of Rathcoole and Saggart. This gave rise to concern as to what might be put into the remaining area between the link road and the N7. Eventually we heard that Avoca were to build a major store there with a large carpark, which eventually happened.

By 1996 a traffic light system which was operating at the eastern entrance to Rathcoole and Newcastle was about to be removed and replaced by a major bridge over the carriageway. This work also involved lowering the dual carriageway. Millions of tons of earth and rock was removed. The surplus material was used to landscape the new Park forming the hill, lakes and waterfall. All this was in keeping with the promise of Christy Boylan given some time earlier.

In the 1990s there was a scheme where major contractors were obliged to contribute a small percentage of their successful contract's income towards artists. The contractor of the new bridge made a financial gift to a selected artist, to create a sculpture. In our case an artist was selected to create a replica of a local lady's hands in bronze and to set the sculpture at the base of the major waterfall in the Park. I wonder how many have noticed these bronze hands or are they aware of their existence. It was in the 1990s that Rathcoole got several multi-story apartment blocks as well as shops, a bank, a Church and several other services. Despite the increase in the local population the then Minister for justice Mr Padraig Flynn in 1992 maintained that Rathcoole did not merit a full time Garda station. In recent years we have got seating at several locations in the Park along with several exercise machines, thanks to the County Council. More recently of course we had the disruption of a major but necessary water mains being taken across the playing fields. Thankfully, it is now completed, and or to sit and watch the swans or other wildlife.

While relaxing there, we should be grateful to the Community Council personnel both past and present who worked hard to bring about such a pleasant local amenity.
